Topics in International Studies: EU, NATO, and European Security

Course Description:

This course will study the historical and current themes of the developing European experience from the perspectives of both Americans and Europeans. We will examine how an increasingly wealthy Europe deals with the economic, military, immigration and social pressures it experiences from the Middle East, Russia and North Africa. Of particular interest will be the changing dynamic of the trans-Atlantic partnership and what challenges it holds for North Americans.

Course Objectives:

Students will develop a greater understanding of the European perspective towards international affairs, defense and security issues – and how this differs from the American perspective.

Despite having been devastated by the greatest conflict in the history of mankind, the Second World War, Europe has accomplished an impressive recovery over the past 60 years. Indeed, much of the world’s focus has remained on Europe since the end of the Cold War as it continues to solidify politically through the European Parliament, economically via the European Union (EU) and militarily with the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO). America must now balance its international and economic policies with this enlarging European entity – a new dynamic with implications for global security.

Course of Study:

The course will follow a series of 10 lectures with associated readings. Audio lectures (30-45 min approx. length) and lecture slides will be available for download from the D2L course webpage. These lectures are entitled:

1. History of Europe Since World War 2;
2. Understanding the EU;
3. Understanding NATO;
4. European Security Issues;
5. European Foreign and Security Policy;
6. EU and NATO Enlargement;
7. Europe and the Former Yugoslavia; and
8. Europe and 9/11 to Date.

Assignments, Grading, and Due Dates:
