#### Course Title:

Small Group Communication: Terrorism and Extremism

#### Course Number:

COMM 6970-101

#### Course Description:

This course is an advanced survey of small group communication scholarship, with a particular focus on how group research can be used to examine terrorism and violent extremism at the small group level. The course will examine key theories, concepts, and research findings from small group communication and related areas of social science, and apply those to the context of extremist and terrorist groups.

### **Course Objectives:**

By the conclusion of the course, students will be familiar with key theories, concepts, and research in small group communication and related areas of scholarship, and will learn how those can be applied to better understand groups in the context of terrorism and extremism.

### **Assignments, Grading and Due Dates:**

#### **Class discussions:**

This course will place a strong emphasis on collaborative learning among students. It is vital for your own learning and that of your fellow students that you be present and participating in class meetings. You are expected to come to each class meeting prepared with comments about the readings and to make substantive contributions to our discussions. (15% of final grade)

#### **Short Reflections:**

For each class meeting (not including the last class day), students will write short reflection papers (1-2 pages, single spaced, 1" margins, 12-pt Times) about that day's readings, responding to prompts provided by the instructor via Canvas. These reflection papers will also help facilitate discussion during the class meetings, so be prepared to briefly discuss some of what you have written. (15% of final grade)

#### **Discussion Leadership:**

For each class meeting (not including the first or last classes), students will be given the opportunity to lead discussion for a portion of the meeting. These discussion opportunities will be assigned on the first day of class for the remainder of the week. You should provide 2-3 discussion questions for the assigned reading that you think warrant further discussion and analysis by the class. (15% of final grade)

**Exam:**

A comprehensive final exam will be given during the final class meeting period, with questions based on course readings, class discussions, and lectures. (35% of final grade)

**Final Reflection Paper:**

Each student will write a reflection paper, due approximately two weeks after the conclusion of the class (**8 pm Eastern Time, August 7, on the OU Canvas course page**), in which they pick a topic of interest to them related to terrorism, extremism, and political violence, and apply the theories, concepts, and research results from the class to that topic, and reflect on the ways that the course material has helped expand their understanding of that topic. The paper should be 6-8 pages long, and use APA style for the format of the paper and any sources cited. Further details on the paper assignment will be provided during the course meetings. Feedback on the final paper will be provided within 1-2 weeks of the due date via Canvas. (20% of final grade)

**Grading:**

This is a letter-graded course: A, B, C, D, or F.

### **Attendance/Grade Policy**

Attendance and participation in interaction, individual assignments, group exercises, simulations, role playing, etc. are valuable aspects of any course because much of the learning comes from discussions in class with other students.
